School Information

Ethos

In Woodburn Primary, staff are committed to providing high quality teaching and learning experiences to support children in exceeding their potential. We pride ourselves in promoting a positive and supportive ethos where everyone feels safe, happy, confident and valued as an individual. We provide a balanced and challenging programme of learning which caters for each child's individual needs and ability. It is our aim to provide a rich and stimulating learning environment where children can grow. We actively encourage parents and carers to be involved in their child's learning and in the life of our school.

Behaviour

In Woodburn we strive to create and maintain a positive, secure and purposeful learning environment, promoting respect. The focus of our school behaviour policy is upon rights and responsibilities using the 'Good to be Green' system. A whole school approach provides consistency and fairness in keeping with the positive school ethos. Class Charters are established in collaboration with the children early in each session. These are agreed by the children and are displayed in the classroom as a visual reminder for children and adults. Good behaviour is positively reinforced by use of a variety of rewards while unacceptable behaviour will result in the use of sanctions. Golden Time is a weekly 30 minutes of privilege time when pupils choose from a variety of activities. This is seen as a reward for all children who uphold the class Charter. Loss of Golden Time is used as a sanction. Regular whole school assemblies provide opportunities to praise classes and individuals and to set very clear expectations of behaviour.

Teaching and Learning

In Woodburn we are committed to developing a community of learners that involves all stakeholders. Our main aim for Teaching and Learning is to provide a framework that will facilitate a high level of achievement and equip our learners with the necessary knowledge and skills that will enable them to become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors. We promote skills for learning, life and work and value the role that parents, carers and the wider community can play in this.

Personal Learning Planning (PLP)

In Woodburn we encourage the children to talk about their learning with staff, peers and parents. Teachers share learning intentions and success criteria with children during lessons. This enables children to have a clear understanding of what they are learning and why. Children's learning journeys are evidenced through classroom displays, children's written work and learning logs.

Additional Support for Learning

Ms Gillies is our Additional Support for Learning teacher this session. She will work closely with the Senior Leadership Team. Her role is to assist the class teacher to ensure that the needs of all children are identified and met. She will do this in a variety of ways for example, through working with individual pupils, groups or the whole class. We also provide additional support to children with English as an Additional Language and children with Social, Emotional and Behavioural Needs.

Priorities

This year the school will focus on the following priorities identified within the school improvement plan:

School Priorities:

- To increase attainment and achievement in Literacy.
- To increase attainment and achievement in Numeracy.
- Improve learners' experiences in Social Studies.
- Develop a positive ethos and improve behaviour.

Cluster Priorities:

The ASG will play a lead role in promoting career long professional learning 'sharing practice' activities, influenced by a coaching and mentoring philosophy.

In Primary 7M our RIGHTS are:
